## Some Wise & Serious Truths – Masonic Education

Why is December 27 the feast of St. John the Evangelist? SAINT JOHN THE EVANGELIST

The placement of St. John near Christmas Day was intentional and has much symbolism. The days following Christmas are full of symbolic meaning, as December 26 honors the first martyr, St. Stephen, who shed his blood for Jesus.

December 27, on the other hand, honors St. John the Evangelist, the disciple of Jesus who wrote the Gospel of John and the book of Revelation. Interestingly enough, he is the only gospel writer to omit a narrative of Jesus' birth. Based on this fact alone it seems strange to include him during the Octave of Christmas.

What is the Church's reason behind this choice?

The St. Andrew Daily Missal gives us a few clues.

It is God whom we adore at Bethlehem during Christmas time. Thus it was natural that St. John, the chief evangelist of the divinity of Christ, should be found beside the crib, to disclose the greatness of the Infant who reposes therein. The Infant God in the crib gathers around Him pure souls: Mary is the Blessed Virgin, Joseph the chaste spouse, St. Stephen the first martyr who washes his robe in the blood of the Lamb. Now behold St. John, the virgin apostle. Dom Prosper Gueranger in his Liturgical Year similarly points to St. John's pure chastity as a reason why he is honored near Christmas.

Nearest to Jesus' Crib, after Stephen, stands John, the Apostle and Evangelist ... next to the sacrifice of Blood, the noblest, the bravest, and which most wins the heart of Him who is the Spouse of souls, is the sacrifice of Virginity ... If the Protomartyr dazzles us with the robes he wears of the bright scarlet of his own blood – is not the virginal whiteness of John's vestment fairer than the untrod snow?

As a result, the Church seeks to highlight St. John's focus on the divinity of Christ as well as hold-up St. John as an prime example of virginity.

It should be noted that St. John's feast is celebrated on December 27 in the Western Church, while the Eastern Church generally honors him on September 26. The Catholic Encyclopedia notes, "The 'departure' or 'assumption' of the Apostle is noted in the Menology of Constantinople and the Calendar of Naples (26 September), which seems to have been regarded as the date of his death."



## From the West – Stephen Walter, PGSB

Time and Time again I hear stories of brothers being asked to sit as line officers immediately after being raised. Since this was the case in my own personal instance, I feel confident in writing about that experience.

It has been said that, more often than not, the aforementioned experience is a detriment to a brother's Masonic Journey. I, however, would like to explore a different view:

The end of one season or state is always, conversely, the start of a new one. When you completed your time in High School, College or Trade School, life and learning didn't end there. Just because your training was "complete" did not mean that your learning of your skill or trade was over; in reality, it was just beginning.

I offer you the same view on your Masonic Journey. Sitting as Junior Steward the first meeting after being raised forced me to study our ritual. Personally, I learn best by repetition mixed with visual aids and comprehension of the material. In this manner, I was able to not just work on memorizing the ritual but understand it as well. Fast forwarding to the first time I sat as a Past Master of the Lodge, I attended Lodge often that year as the New Worshipful Master was a close friend even before our Masonic Journeys and I wanted to show him my support. For a couple of years after that, my attendance dropped off at my blue lodge due to serving on Grand Staff, much needed time with my family and Masonic Burnout.

More recently, my Masonic Journey was thrust back into forward motion due to a few different occurrences. The first was when I was present as a brother was being raised. During the Bible charge, Past Master Marty Hogan said "You will be the last to think we have taught you all that a Master Mason can Learn." WHAT!!?? That statement resonated with me more than it had in the past. Another close friend of mine found himself in the position of skipping the chair in the West on his way to the East. I told him that I would do whatever I could to support him. After conferring with a couple other Past Masters, I was nominated and elected Senior Warden. The last occurrence was showing up early for Officer practice and picking up a book from the collection of a brother who met an untimely death, I could write an entire essay about him. It was somewhere around this point in my Masonic Journey that I realized I had stopped learning what it was to be a Freemason. I had accomplished so many things, yet here I am still in the middle of my Journey. What was I doing? I remember joining this fraternity thinking that I was going to learn how to be a better man, AM I DONE? The answer was, NO.

My Masonic Journey is NOT Over. Though I have no aspirations to ascend the Grand Line or go through the officer chairs of an appendant body, I do wish to keep learning. Life as a Past master of a Blue Lodge is NOT THE END; it is merely the beginning.

As Past Masters, our Journey should not only be to aid and uplift our Lodge Officers, but also to the advancement of knowledge and virtue of ourselves. We can accomplish these things on our own, but it is much more enjoyable to do these things with our brothers. Bearing witness to good Masonic ritual can always inspire hire thoughts and nobler deeds. Simply being present
