THIRD DEGREE AT FORT MILES IN JUNE

In Cape Henlopen State Park in Sussex County, at a key point along Delaware's Atlantic Coast, there is a bunker from World War II.

The bunker was part of Fort Miles, a U.S. military installation built in 1941 to fend off German Navy attacks. Its site at the mouth of the Delaware Bay near Lewes gave good vantage for guarding the bay and Delaware River, as well as Philadelphia and coastal oil refineries.

Named for Lt. Gen. Nelson Appleton Miles, the fort sprawled over nearly 5,000 acres and was one of the largest, most-heavily armed coast installations in U.S. history, built at a cost of \$22 million or more than \$325 million in modern dollars.

The fort – at its height equipped with 16 major caliber weapons – ceased most military operation after the war, state historians say, and 543 acres of its land were transferred back to the state and became parkland in 1964.

The Fort Miles Historical Association was started in 2003 and became instrumental in gaining the site's listing on the National Register of Historic Places two years later.

The officers of Temple Lodge No. 9 will confer a Master Mason degree inside of the bunker on June 8, 2017. Seating is limited to 50 brothers plus the officers. There will be tickets available on a first come first served basis and offered exclusively to Temple No. 9 members until May 25, 2017. Tickets will then become available to anyone in the fraternity. Tickets are only \$10. Please call any officer for tickets. All proceeds from ticket sales will be donated to the park.

The officers will open lodge at 5:00PM, go at ease for dinner. Dinner will be provided by the candidate at Jefferson Lodge in Lewes at 6:00PM. Parking is very limited therefore we will carpool from Jefferson Lodge to the Bunker to confer the degree at approximately 7:00PM. Don't delay in getting a ticket for this first of its kind degree!

Mentorship Corner - Tom McMurray, PM

This is a short article about the importance of hands to men and Masons. A man's hand are often a true indication of his vocation, long tapered soft fingers, those of an artist, while big rough expansive hand, those of a mechanic or metal worker. The offer of our hands to a Brother has little matter as to the vocation of the owner, but only as a means to offer a token of friendship and recognition.

With all this importance in all areas of the world and in all times, it seems only fitting that "Hands" were used with significance in Freemasonry from its earliest times. Indeed our ancient Brethren, the operative Mason, made his living with his Hand Tools. Can we be surprised then at the use of "Hand to back" or of the E.A. being instructed that our sign of fidelity was two right hands joined or by two fingers supporting each other by the right hand? Fidelity has its own sign. We use it when we pledge allegiance to the flag and in many Jurisdictions when we are at prayer.

Your hand can work for Freemasonry when you take the time to call another Brother on the telephone, be he sick or well; be his need great or small. Reach out and touch his life. Touch is universal. Touch is the expression of love. A vase of priceless beauty and value was once a lump of clay molded by two hands. "The strong grip of a Master Mason" can accomplish many things. Shake the hand of your Brother with pride. Be proud of your Lodge. Be proud of Freemasonry. Don't lose your grip. You have earned the right to take me as I take you.
